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
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Our Vision



Our population is small – just four million people – with 60 percent now living in major metropolitan areas. New Zealand's indigenous people, Maori, make up 14 percent of the population. Although our heritage is predominantly European, the arrival of new immigrants of many different nationalities and cultures has, in more recent times, introduced a rich cultural diversity to our communities.

Small though we may be, New Zealand has produced some of the world's most highly-respected citizens — the late, iconic Sir Edmund Hillary, for example — and a number of the world's momentous discoveries in science, technology and medicine. We are adventurous people; we love to travel and explore. We're addicted to the 'great outdoors' — with such breathtaking scenery who wouldn't be — and sport is our national passion.

Auckland lies at the most narrow point of the North Island – an isthmus that separates the Waitemata Harbour on the east from the Manukau Harbour on the west. It straddles an ancient volcanic field which left 48 dormant cones dotted around the city environs.

Beautiful beaches are just a short excursion from the city centre by foot, skates or bike.

Auckland has the nickname 'City of Sails' because there are more pleasure boats per capita here than any other city in the world. However, it could just as easily be called 'City of Trails.' 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Action

Whether you prefer life slow and sedate, fast and frantic, or in-the-middle mellow, the biggest challenge you will face when visiting Auckland is deciding what to do now and what to leave for next time. A few ideas to start you thinking:

Slow and sedate

Includes:

Auckland Art Gallery – significant collection of New Zealand's historic and contemporary art.

Kelly Tarltons – underwater world, marine magic.

Markets – from earthy to ethnic, cultural to creative, there are markets aplenty.

MOTAT – Museum of Transport and Technology. Auckland Museum – one of the country's finest heritage buildings.

National Maritime Museum – exhibition halls and on-water heritage vessels.

Sky Tower – tallest building in the Southern Hemisphere (328m) with amazing city views.

Auckland Zoo – roam wild for a day.

Fast and frantic

Includes:

4Track – burn along beaches and forest trails on 300cc quad bikes; mind the bumps!

Bungy Jump – leap from the Harbour Bridge; do you dare?

Canyoning – abseil showering waterfalls and volcanic rock faces; you will get wet.

Sky Jump – plummet from the Tower; in harness of course!

Sky Walk – 192 metres above ground and just 1.2 metres wide; walk if you're willing!

In-the-middle mellow

Auckland Bridge Climb – for a unique view of the city and sea.

Balloon Safari – a stunning way to spend a clear winter morning.

Dolphin and Whale Safari – great chance of sightings all year round.

Harbour Cruises – charter yacht, cruise ferry or luxury launch; take your pick.





Accommodation

Auckland has accommodation for all occasions and every preference. No matter where you choose to stay, you won't be far from breathtaking scenery, invigorating walks, exhilarating adventures, idyllic islands, outstanding food and wine, great shopping and exciting nightlife.

- luxury hotels and apartments.
- tourist hotels and motels.
- backpackers' and budget hostels.
- hosted or self-contained lodgings.
- camping.

Climate

July is mid-winter and the temperature range for Auckland is 7°C-15°C (45°F-59°F). The weather is variable with the likelihood of some rain. Although warm clothes, raincoats, and umbrellas are the gear for July, our winter weather is more temperate than in the northern hemisphere and generally doesn't deter visitors from fully enjoying their Auckland experience.

Wining and dining

A good way to describe Auckland's cuisine is 'Pacific Rim' – a unique blend of Asian and Pacific flavours. Seafood is the premier selection on many Auckland restaurant menus, accompanied by fresh, locally-grown produce. The original inner city suburbs – Parnell, Ponsonby and Herne Bay – are a good place to start, or head for a restaurant at the Viaduct Harbour.

Try New Zealand green-lipped mussels or succulent Clevedon Coast oysters for a favourite local delicacy. If you prefer off-the-hoof options it's hard to beat New Zealand lamb or venison.

Many of New Zealand's oldest vineyards, as well as numerous up-and-coming estates, are located in the Auckland region. You'll find a broad selection of top-quality wines from around New Zealand on the wine list at most restaurants.

But don't stop at the table – take a wine-tasting tour to one or more of the first-class vineyards within easy reach of the city.

Transport

Auckland International Airport, 21 kilometres from the city centre, is reached by car, bus and taxi.

Many of Auckland's activities and attractions are within walking distance in the central city and many others are within half-an-hour by transport. The city is well-served with public transport.

Bus – the city has extensive bus services including:

- Airport transfers
- City explorers
- Free inner city bus, 10-minute intervals throughout the day.
- Link bus, between central locations, 10-minute daytime intervals, 15-minute evenings.
- Car rental available at the international airport or locations throughout the city.
- Helicopter several helicopter operators offering unique transport and sightseeing options.
- Ferries link Auckland city with the North Shore and islands throughout the Hauraki Gulf.
- Organised tours sightseeing trips with personal guides are relaxing options.
- Taxi there are numerous companies throughout Auckland.
- Train a network runs through central and south Auckland.

BMX

The Auckland region has:

- almost 20 percent of New Zealand's BMX clubs.
- around 25 percent of New Zealand's BMX riders.









BMX New Zealand

BMX New Zealand was established in 1980. It is the national body responsible for running all aspects of BMX in New Zealand.

- There are 29 BMX clubs in New Zealand with approximately 1,800 registered riders. The sport has almost doubled in size since 1998.
- New Zealand is on the rise internationally and is ranked in the top half-dozen in both elite men and women. As at 1 March 2008, Marc Willers and Sarah Walker are ranked first in the world in elite men and women respectively.
- New Zealand BMX has a well-established and successful junior development programme (Kiwi Sprocket), aimed at riders aged under eight. Kiwi Sprocket is accepted by BikeNZ as being a training platform for all junior cycling in New Zealand.
- Current and former leading New Zealand cyclists commenced their cycling careers in BMX. Cameron Cole, 2006 MTB Downhill Junior World Champion, was also a National BMX champion in 2006 and raced BMX since an early age.
 Vanessa Quin, 2004 MTB Downhill World Champion, rode BMX from age 12.
- New Zealand officials and race-meeting management operate at the highest level. New Zealander, Ian Mackie, will be the Chief Commissaire at the Olympic Games in Beijing. Our leading officials and commissaires were mentored by Mackie and are, in turn, mentoring others. This group would officiate at the 2011 World Championships.

- BMX New Zealand has solid organisational strengths, with clear vision for the future, including the development of management skills to expand the sport into the future.
- Since 2004, BMX New Zealand has regularly and successfully held international ranking events with athletes competing from Australia, South Africa and Asia.
- BMX New Zealand and Australia BMX have strong bonds directed toward the sport's development. New Zealand athletes at all levels race regularly in Australia. A bi-annual test exchange for 11 year olds and 14-15 year olds is a calendar fixture and a key developmental tool for these age groups, as well as introducing them to international racing.


The venue: Vector Arena

The brand new Vector Arena is a world-class, multi-purpose, all-weather, indoor arena situated on the edge of the Auckland CBD on a 5-hectare site. A superb performance area at the heart of the venue is surrounded by fixed, removable and retractable seating configurations which allow the arena to host an audience of up to 12,000 people for a diverse range of events. Even after a BMX racing track is built inside Vector Arena for the 2011 BMX World Championships, there will still be enough seating for 7,000 spectators.

The design elements of Vector Arena are inspired by New Zealand's rich cultural values and the heritage of the local Maori. The arena boosts sophisticated technology and international excellence in design and construction.

With its convenient central location, Vector Arena is within walking distance of the Auckland City Centre and the major public transport hubs – Britomart railway station and bus terminal, and the downtown ferry terminal.

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A Champion Event

The BMX track

The Vector Arena has available space for a regulation BMX track. This spectacular, fast and challenging indoor track will be built under the guidance of the UCI Technical Delegate and UCI Track Builder, 10 days before the World Championships, as per regulations.

Meeting rooms

The Vector Arena has the capacity to host all the rooms as set out in the 'UCI Practical Organisation Guide UCI BMX World Championships 2007 Edition'.

Rider and team registration

Registration will be based in the centre of the lower atrium for the duration of the tournament. This large, easily-secured area is readily accessible and very visible to arrivals at the Vector Arena. Importantly, those seeking accreditation are able to enter from one side and exit from the other.

Staging, timing transponder fitting and bike storage areas

A large marquee will be erected at the rear of the Vector Arena as a staging and transponder fitting area. The marquee will be linked to the Arena, allowing riders to remain under cover. As this area is permanently fenced-off, it will be simple to ensure that only accredited riders and team personnel have access.

A separate marquee alongside the staging area will provide bike storage. Portable toilets in this area will service the riders.

Accreditation centre

The accreditation centre will be open for the full week, alongside the registration area in the lower atrium. Secure temporary walls will separate the two areas. Full services will be available, including appropriate internet and telephone connections.

Race headquarters

The race headquarters will be operational in the Production and Promoters Offices from the opening Monday. These adjacent rooms are directly opposite the Commissaires Room with full services available.

Commissaires room

The Commissaires will reside in the Green Room as this has easy access to the track, plus it has full internet access with sufficient space for eight people working at desks.

Race administration and timing offices

The Race Administration and Timing Offices will be adjacent to the Commissaires Room in Team Dressing Rooms A and B. This is a large room with its own toilet and shower facilities. Full internet access will be provided.

Team manager meeting room

The Team Manager Meeting Room will be in the Hospitality Suite alongside the Atrium. This has the advantage of its own entrance so can be accessed even if the main arena is closed. It will seat 35 in theatre style, has tables and chairs for six and a small PA system.

Press room

The Vector Arena has a permanent purpose-built Media Room with full internet access. The press room is adjacent to a special seating area for the media above the start and finish areas. The media-only area is easily secured and has excellent viewing of the full BMX track.

Press conferences

The press conference room will be set up for the week in the future Function Room alongside the atrium. Dressing Rooms 7 to 10 will be available for riders to tidy-up prior to interviews and press conferences.

VIP facilities

The Bistro Arena Balcony Suite will be the main hospitality area during the week. This area can be accessed externally without patrons having to go through the main entrance. It is also close to the VIP seating area in the main arena.

Two additional VIP rooms will also be available for smaller functions of 10 to 20 people.

Medical area

Competitors can expect the best possible medical treatment. The Medical Area will be established near the finish line where there will be easy ambulance access. The nearest public hospital is 3km from the Vector Arena.

Anti doping

Anti doping will be based in team Dressing Rooms C & D as this is close to the finish line and has shower and toilet facilities. There is ample space for an administration and registration area, as well as waiting area for the athletes.

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Security

The Vector Arena is a very secure site and already has security staff managing the building. The World Championship organisers will engage extra security during the event to ensure a safe and fair environment for the competitors, supporters and public.

Parking

There are 7,000 car parks within 1.5kms of Vector Arena. Disability car parking can be reserved or, alternatively, there is a drop-off zone for those displaying valid mobility documentation.

There is also coach/bus parking for each event at Vector Arena. Coaches/buses will be directed to a marshalled area for parking in the vicinity of Vector Arena.

Public transport

Bus – Britomart station is a ten-minute walk from the Arena; stop for all major bus routes, including the free City Circuit Bus.

Train – rail access to the Vector Arena will be via Britomart station.

Ferry – the Downtown ferry terminal is a ten-minute walk from the Arena.

Special needs facilities

The Vector Arena provides extensive facilities for patrons with special needs including: parking; preferential gate access; fully accessible Arena entry points; lifts; seating; toilets; audio and vision aids.

Food and beverage

Seven separate food outlets, located on both the upper and lower levels of the Arena, operate during events, providing a wide range of refreshments.

Insurance and risk management

While in New Zealand any medical costs, including hospitalisation, will be covered so that it is not necessary for riders to have health insurance. In addition, New Zealand operates a no-fault accident compensation scheme. This means people cannot sue for personal injury caused by accident and prohibits an injured person from recovering compensatory damages for personal injury.

Merchandise

BikeNZ will seek the rights from the UCI to produce event merchandise. A full range of clothing is envisaged that will give the competitors and supporters a long-term memory of the event.

Accommodation

There are approximately 4,000 hotel rooms within 2km of Vector Arena with accommodation to suit all tastes and budgets. For example:

Hyatt Regency – 5-star, five-minutes' walk to Arena or city; has 269 guest rooms and 100 luxurious apartment suites. Beautifully appointed rooms, all with stunning views of Auckland.

Currently organising the Winter Games NZ 2009.

Timing

Mid-July in Auckland is a great time and place to hold the 2011 BMX World Championship.

Mid-July is the 'off-season' in New Zealand so the event will not compete with the city's other major calendar activities.

New Zealand schools begin their two-week term-break on 15 July 2011 which will allow families to attend, boosting interest in the event and spectator numbers.

It will be the lead-up period to Rugby World Cup 2011, to be held in New Zealand later that year – many eyes in the sporting world will already be turned on New Zealand and some international sporting media are likely to be in the country to check World Cup progress.

All promotions will direct people to the event website where all information on the World Championships will be available. The website will be fully operational 15 months before the event in Auckland.


Media communications

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

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New Zealand

Banking

Major Banks: ANZ, ASB, Bank of New Zealand (BNZ), KiwiBank, National Bank, Westpac.

Most banks are open between 9.30am

– 4.30pm, Monday to Friday.

Climate

New Zealand's seasons are the reverse of the Northern Hemisphere. The warmest months are December to February while the coldest are June to August. In July the weather is variable with the likelihood of rain.

Currency

New Zealand has a decimal currency system with 100 cents in the New Zealand dollar (\$). Coins: 10c, 20c, 50c, \$1, \$2; Notes: \$5, \$10, \$20, \$50, \$100.

Electricity

New Zealand's AC electricity supply operates at 230/240 volts (50 hertz). Most hotels and motels provide 110 volt 20 watt AC sockets for electric razors. An adaptor is needed for all other electrical equipment.

GST

All goods and services in New Zealand are subject to a 12.5 percent Goods and Services Tax (GST). Generally prices include GST unless specifically stated otherwise.

Language

New Zealand has three official languages: English, Maori, and sign language. English is the predominant language.

Opening hours

Businesses, shops and service centres are generally open from 8.30am to 5.30pm, Monday to Friday. Shopping centres are open seven days a week.

Travel funds

Credit Cards - all major credit cards are accepted.

ATMs – New Zealand has a huge network of ATMs and EFTPOS (electronic funds transfer point of sale) facilities are in most shops. Most overseas credit cards and major bank cards can be used in New Zealand ATMs, provided they have a four-digit encoded pin number.

Travellers Cheques – are accepted at many hotels and tourist shops.

Bureau de Change – kiosks and foreign exchange desks are located in most major centres.

Visa requirements

A visitor's visa is required for travel to New Zealand except for citizens of visa-waiver countries:

Andorra, Argentina, Austria, Australia, Bahrain, Belgium, Brazil, Brunei, Canada, Chile, Cyprus, Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hong Kong, Hungary, Iceland, Ireland, Israel, Italy, Japan, Korea, Kuwait, Latvia, Liechtenstein, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Malaysia, Malta, Mexico, Monaco, Netherlands, Norway, Oman, Poland, Portugal, Qatar, San Marino, Saudi Arabia, Singapore, Slovak Republic, South Africa, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, United Arab Emirates, United States, United Kingdom, Uruguay.

Water

New Zealand towns and cities have excellent water supplies and tap water is fresh and safe to drink.



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
